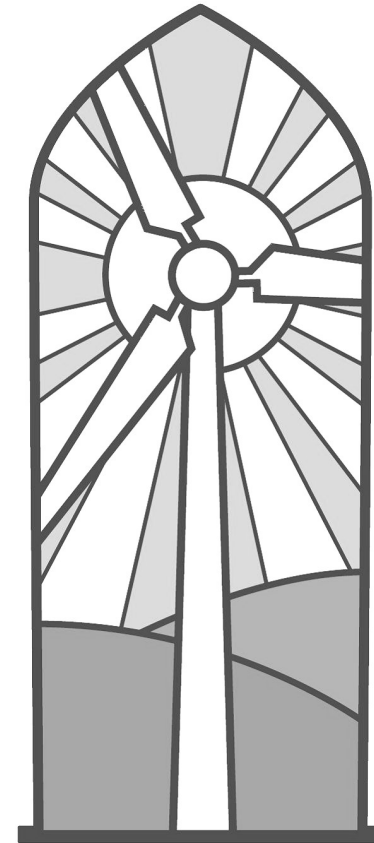

# Climate legislation?

## Why should I care?

Our senators are debating legislation called the Clean Energy Jobs and American Power Act. The goal is to put a cap on our global warming pollution, provide incentives to accelerate a transition to clean energy, and create new jobs. Smart policy solutions will help ensure a peaceful world for our children.

Governmental, military and scientific experts have concluded that climate change is having significant geopolitical impacts around the world, and is contributing to a host of problems including poverty, environmental degradation, and the weakening of national governments. Their assessments warn that the storms, droughts and food shortages predicted from a warming planet are currently occurring and will worsen in coming decades.

## How is it a **Faith** issue?

All faith traditions have a responsibility to care for God's Creation. We all have a shared responsibility to care for our neighbors and the least among us. Scientists tell us that the poor, elderly and infirm in the U.S., and people in the poorest countries least able to adapt, will be most affected by the climate crisis. While we are already experiencing some of the impacts from climate change, the world our children will face may be unlike anything in human history.

# How can I take **Action**?

The most important thing you can do right now is to call both of your U.S. Senators and ask them to support strong climate legislation like the Clean Energy Jobs and American Power Act. The phone number for the U.S. Senate switchboard is 202-224-3121. After you are connected to each Senator's office, ask for the aide who works on energy and climate. Find out your senators' positions on the bill. Let them know you support strong renewable energy and energy efficiency requirements and incentives.

You can also work with North Carolina Interfaith Power & Light (NC IPL) to help your congregation and your household conserve energy and become more energy efficient. This will help you reduce your global warming pollution and save money on your energy bills. Measure and track your house of worship's carbon footprint at [www.coolcongregations.org](http://www.coolcongregations.org). There is also a household calculator on that site - just fill out the brief questionnaire, print out the results, and track the efficacy of energy efficiency improvements that you make over time by entering updated information.
